It was decided to build a new stone mausoleum that was finished in 1930. Lenin's body was moved to Siberia in 1941 fearing that the Germans would take Moscow and get their hands on his remains. A new stone sarcophagus was constructed in 1972, nothing else changes since then.

It took roughly four months for the team of scientists to ready the body for viewing. Eight months after Lenin's death, on August 1st 1924, his mausoleum opened to the public in Red Square, and it has attracted a crowd ever since.
