## **Outcome Measures | CMS**

Outcome measures may seem to represent the “gold standard” in measuring quality, but an outcome is the result of numerous factors, many beyond providers’ control. Risk-adjustment methods—mathematical models that correct for differing characteristics within a population, such as patient health status—can help account for these factors.

cause measurement of outcomes that matter to patients, aside from survival, remains limited. And for many conditions, death is a rare outcome whose measurement fails to differentiate excellent from merely competent providers. Experience in other fields suggests that systematic outcomes measurement is the sine qua non of value improvement.

## **Standardizing Patient Outcomes Measurement Standardizing ...**

In measuring patient safety, we can be guided by the three dimensions of measuring quality of care developed by

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Donabedian et al, namely structure (how care is organised), process (what healthcare professionals (HCP) do to maintain or improve health, either for healthy people or for those diagnosed with a healthcare condition) and outcome (what ultimately happens to the patient) .

### **Measurement tools and outcome measures used in ...**

Patient outcomes reflected in the endorsed measures are important and the act of measurement has without question generated selective attention and resource allocation toward reducing complications. However, this may be accompanied by the diversion of attention and resources away from other, perhaps equally important, patient needs.

### **Outcome Measurement in Nursing: Imperatives, Ideals ...**

A patient-reported outcome measure (PROM) is any instrument, scale, or

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single-item measure used to assess the PRO concept as perceived by the patient, obtained by directly asking the patient to self-report. PROMs include any method used to collect patient input, from diaries and event logs, to one-item or multi-item multi-domain scales.

### **Improving Outcomes That Matter Most to Patients**

Measuring outcomes is a multi-step and iterative process that should involve interdisciplinary teams at every step. Even when focusing on nursing-specific outcomes, teams can and should involve administrators, clinicians, and others who work closely with nurses.

### **Improving Patient Experience and Reducing Cost by ...**

A team of clinicians, researchers and people living with HIV has developed a 'patient-reported outcome measure' (PROM) for use in HIV care - the Positive Outcomes HIV PROM. We spoke to Professor Richard Harding at King's

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College London about the rigorous process used to develop the tool and how it can support clinical care by helping patients to express their needs.

### **Developing a patient-reported outcome measure for HIV ...**

In England standard patient reported outcome measures are being used to track the outcomes of patients with four common surgical conditions. 17 18 In the Netherlands, care teams are using web based applications and mobile health to monitor the quality of life of children with cancer. 19 In the United States, over 60 practices in the ImproveCareNow network are using patient reported outcomes and clinical data to improve results for children with inflammatory bowel disease.

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
